Scottish Schools' Young Writer of the Year 2021/22

Launch of this year's prestigious competition

The online current affairs magazine, *Scottish Review*, in association with the Young Programme charity, is delighted to announce the launch of the 2021/22 **Scottish Schools' Young Writer of the Year**. As in previous years, there are generous prizes to be won!

Who can take part?

The competition is open to pupils who are 15 to 18 years old on the closing date of **Thursday 16 December 2021**. A prize of £600 will be presented to the winning writer, and £300 each to two runners-up. All highly commended and commended writers will receive a gift voucher. The top three award-winning entries will be published with an overall report in a special edition of the *Scottish Review*.

The judges

The winning papers will be determined by a panel of distinguished judges including novelist, James Robertson; broadcaster and writer, Sally Magnusson; emeritus professor of adult and continuing education, University of Glasgow, Jean Barr; and politician and former secretary general of NATO, Lord Robertson of Port Ellen.

The Challenge

Each entry must be a work of **non- fiction**. Pupils should imagine they are writing a feature or an opinion column for an intelligent magazine or serious newspaper. It could, for example, be a commentary about something in the news, thoughts about a cultural experience (a review of an exhibition or a theatrical production perhaps), an account of a personal experience of some kind (a trip, a meeting, an incident), a piece about a sports event (major or minor), a profile of, or an interview with, an individual.

Around 1,000 words are required (no fewer than 900; no more than 1,200 – entries outside of these margins will not be considered).

Advice to entrants

Before you begin writing, you should have a look at columns in, for example, The Times, The Guardian, The Scotsman, i, or in quality magazines such as Scottish Review or The Spectator to get a feel for what is required.

You should bear in mind that the start of the piece is vital in hooking the reader's interest.

You should always have the reader in mind and keep asking yourself: is this interesting? Will the reader understand my logic? Does anything need clarification?

You should read the piece aloud to yourself. If you get confused, you should edit/rewrite/reorganise/reappraise; if you can't understand something that you have written, then neither will the reader.

The judges will be looking for insight and originality as well as stylish prose which has clarity and avoids cliché and jargon.


2020/21 results:
